Promoting leadership and participation of persons with disabilities in peace processes

**Side-event on the occasion of the International Day of Persons with
Disabilities and the Humanitarian Week
December 7th, 9.00-10:30 AM**

The Permanent Missions of Poland, Dominican Republic, Germany, Kenya, the United States are pleased to organize a side-event on the occasion of the International Day of Persons with Disabilities and the Humanitarian Week focusing on the role of persons with disabilities in peace processes.

Context

There are currently around one billion of persons with disabilities, including persons with physical, intellectual, sensory and psychosocial impairments. This number is increasing due to global population aging, increased incidence of chronic diseases and injuries caused by, inter alia, armed conflicts.

The idea that all members of a conflict-affected society should have a meaningful role in shaping peace, is gradually receiving widespread global recognition. Evidence demonstrates positive impact of the inclusion of persons with disabilities in prevention, resolution, reconciliation, reconstruction, peacebuilding, addressing the root causes of conflict as well as post-conflict reconstruction. As it is stated in the report of the Special Rapporteur on the rights of persons with disabilities “Persons with disabilities and their representative organizations are largely untapped resources in the essential process of peacebuilding in post-conflict situations. They have a right to be engaged meaningfully. They have critical insights into what an inclusive society and economy actually mean. They have an instinctive attitude

towards valuing difference, which is of importance in the healing process, and they represent a humane space that can transcend sectarian or ideological differences and thus provide an added incentive for the various parties to tone down their differences and converge on the importance of inclusion for all.”¹.

Yet the conversation on the rights of persons with disabilities in armed conflict largely focuses on the protection of persons with disabilities while it overlooks their skills and potential as peacebuilders. As a result, little attention has been paid to the meaningful participation of persons with disabilities in conflict-prevention, conflict-resolution, peacekeeping, mediation, post-conflict rehabilitation, peacebuilding and reconciliation at local, regional and country level. The UNSC resolution 2475 (2019) on the Protection of Persons with Disabilities in Armed Conflict, is the first framework to recognise the critical contributions of persons with disabilities and their representative organisations to the peace process.

Objective

The aim of the event is to discuss how to ensure a more inclusive and participatory approach towards persons with disabilities during conflicts and reflect on possible measures to implement adequate solutions and emergency responses in conflict zones, as well as to reflect on the role of the Security Council and the wider United Nations system in this regard. Moreover, the meeting will allow to discuss in details the findings of the report of the Special Rapporteur of the rights of persons with disabilities presented to the Third Committee of the GA that’s for the first time focuses on persons with disabilities in the context of peace and security.

In particular the discussion will aim to:

- highlight the constructive role and contributions of persons with disabilities in peace processes;
- identify factors and dynamics that contribute to their inclusion or exclusion in peace process/peace agreements, the challenges of ensuring effective and meaningful representation, and the most successful mechanisms for empowerment and inclusion in post-conflict societies that take into account also the expertise on disability mainstreaming policies;
- discuss on how to ensure a shift from the medical model to a human rights-based approach regarding persons with disabilities in crisis-affected communities.
- Discuss on how activities under different frameworks (eg. UNSC, CRPD) can be mutually reinforcing and beneficial to ensure greater coherence of efforts aimed at enhancing the inclusivity of peace processes
